




About the Virginia Risk Sharing Association



The Virginia Risk Sharing Association (VRSA) is the **first and most financially sound** self-insurance pool in the Commonwealth of Virginia. For 40 years, VRSA has provided auto, property, liability, and workers' compensation coverage to Virginia local political subdivisions.

VRSA is here to ease what worries our members – so that you can focus on what matters most – serving your community. Through our comprehensive coverages, services, tools and resources, VRSA provides more than insurance.

VRSA provides comprehensive risk management program support including law enforcement, human resources, local government, risk management and communications consulting.

VRSA's staff includes safety professionals, two former police officers, one certified human resources professional, an accredited public relations specialist,

a former town manager, and a team of seasoned claims representatives and underwriters.

VRSA is governed by a Members' Supervisory Board comprised of eight elected or chief appointed officials from member jurisdictions and the executive director of the Virginia Municipal League. The board meets four times each year to establish goals, set rates, adopt a budget and handle other pool business.

VRSA contracts with nationally recognized money managers, actuaries, financial and claims auditors to ensure that members' insurance dollars are maximized and risks mitigated.

VRSA is sponsored by the Virginia Municipal League.

A message from the chair and

managing director

Like many of you, VRSA started 2020 with big plans.

This year marks the pool's 40th anniversary – one we planned to celebrate by focusing on our mission of providing financial stability through risk management to Virginia's political subdivisions, so they can effectively serve their communities.

In 2020, more than ever, this mission remains at our core.

As we navigate and respond to the challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic and widespread social unrest, VRSA staff remain proactive in taking steps to ease the worries of our members.

This spring, in response to reduced exposure, VRSA refunded members 15 percent of their annual 2019-2020 automobile liability and general liability contributions, totaling \$1.2M. To assist members with funding risk management equipment and training, VRSA increased the amount of Risk Management Grant funding available this year, and made COVID-19 related personal protective equipment grant-eligible.

We didn't stop there.

As reinsurers all over the country began adding COVID-19 exclusions, we decided that VRSA would not add a COVID-19 exclusion to our primary liability policies, in order to provide our members with the broadest possible protection in the wake of unprecedented challenges.

In fact, VRSA has already received hundreds of workers' compensation claims related to COVID-19,

primarily from public safety personnel including firefighters and emergency medical technicians. Fortunately, many of these claims have been notifications of exposure, and only a very small percentage of those exposed eventually tested positive.


For those testing positive, and whose claims are deemed compensable under the Virginia Workers' Compensation Act (VWCA), most required little to no treatment and recovered within weeks. However, for those few with severe symptoms, VRSA is committed to covering the costs for their hospitalizations and medical care.

VRSA public safety specialist Gary Dillon also began working with VRSA law enforcement agencies on policy reviews, virtual roundtables and discussions of best practices in law enforcement as Virginia communities navigated challenging terrain.



For VRSA's school members facing immeasurably difficult choices, VRSA brought together school members for several roundtable discussions on a number of topics including: strategies for minimizing exposure and the VOSH Emergency Temporary Standard.

VRSA staff also worked with Hanover County
Public Schools to produce a video on bestpractices in sanitizing and disinfecting to share
among members, and participated in roundtable
discussions with the Special Education and General
Education Pupil Transportation group on various
topics relating to COVID-19.



We quickly pivoted from in-person to virtual engagements, hosting 35 online events from mid-March through the end of the summer. We developed a COVID-19 resources page on our website, and hosted 15 virtual engagements and roundtables directly related to the pandemic.

Additionally, five VRSA staff members - Thomas Bullock, Fonda Craig, Eddie Shelton, Vinny Gallo and Gary Dillon, were certified as COVID-19 Infectious Disease Prevention Specialists by the National Association of Safety Professionals (NASP).

This allows our consultants to provide COVID-19 risk assessments, classify worker exposure to infectious disease; develop risk reduction strategies; and build an Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response Plan.

VRSA members are fortunate that two of our senior safety specialists, Eddie Shelton and Vinny Gallo, who previously worked for the Virginia Occupational Safety and Health (VOSH), prepared a "plug and train" template for member use in meeting the requirements of VOSH's Emergency Temporary Standard.

We do all of this so that you can focus on what matters most – serving your community. And, we are able to do this because of our financial strength.

It is this strength that enables VRSA to maintain stable rates you can count on, that allows VRSA to manage claims and effectively protect member employees and assets, and that allows VRSA to provide value-added services and resources designed to empower members to manage their risk.

If this year has shown us anything, it's that there are significant challenges and uncertainties ahead. However, one thing remains certain – and that is VRSA's unwavering commitment to our members.

We look forward to working with you through these unprecedented challenges.

VRSA celebrates 40 years of providing "More than Insurance"

They say history repeats itself. 40 years ago, Virginia local governments were facing uncertainty.

Today, we are all facing uncertainty. While the types of uncertainty may have changed, one thing has not - VRSA's commitment to easing the worries of our members.

In 1980, Virginia local political subdivisions were facing an extraordinarily volatile insurance market. Commercial carriers were raising premiums from year to year while offering only limited coverage. Finding coverage for the unique exposures of local governments was difficult.

Many local governments felt their only choices were between significantly higher premiums or self-insurance.

That's when the Virginia Municipal League (VML) stepped in to lobby for legislation allowing local governments to self-insure under the Virginia Workers' Compensation Act - leading to the creation of the Virginia Municipal Group Self Insurance Association (VMGSIA) on July 1, 1980.

A lot has changed over the past 40 years. Legislation expanded, allowing self-insurance pools to add coverages, resulting in the Virginia Municipal Liability Pool (VMLP), providing general liability and automobile coverages.

Eventually, the VMGSIA and the VMLP merged, forming VML Insurance Programs (VMLIP), and in 2019, VMLIP re-branded to the Virginia Risk Sharing Association (VRSA).

More Than Insurance - Since beginning small with 10 members of the VMGSIA, VRSA has



expanded to more than 460 members of all types, including cities, counties, towns, authorities, schools, and more. With these new member types, came new and unique exposures which resulted in additional coverages, resources and services.

Throughout the past 40 years, two constants have been VRSA's commitment to our members and VRSA's ability to *adapt to change*.

In the 1990's, VRSA adapted to change by expanding coverage and adding protections to address member worries - adding property, inland marine, boiler and machinery, fidelity, crime, public officials' and law enforcement liability coverages.

It was during this decade that VRSA expanded our consulting footprint with five full-time safety consultants conducting hazard evaluation studies and safety inspections, and providing safety recommendations and on-site member-training.

Today, VRSA employs three full-time safety consultants, two of whom previously worked for Virginia Occupational Safety and Health (VOSH), providing members with first-hand knowledge of VOSH regulations and inspections.

As our consulting practice expanded, so did our computerized and online training resources. In the late 1990's, VRSA staff developed safety modules, provided to members on CD-ROM as a one-stop source for safety training materials on topics such as incident investigation, confined space entry, and more.

Today, VRSA members can access more than 1,000

training resources on the VRSA website, including recorded webinars, modules, bulletins, videos, safety training kits, and more.



This includes nearly 300 courses available through the VRSA Online University and the VRSA Public Safety Academy - covering topics relevant to all levels of government including to those specific to law enforcement, emergency medical services, and fire and rescue.

In 1999, VRSA launched the "50-50 Matching Grant" program, the precursor to today's Risk Management Grant Program. Grant funds are available for use in purchasing safety equipment, attending training sessions, or for special educational endeavors aimed at broadening member understanding of governmental management.

Since the program began, the amount of funding available has steadily increased. This year, in response to COVID-19, the VRSA Members' Supervisory Board voted to increase funding available in the program again, as well as make COVID-19 related personal protective equipment eligible for funding.

Over the last 10 years, the grant program has provided more than \$3 million in funding to strengthen risk management programs and help members promote their strategic goals.

Moving into the 2000's, VRSA continued to focus on providing value-added resources and services for our members with the goal of serving all of the insurance needs of Virginia's local governments - from the smallest to the largest.

One way VRSA has met this goal is through the expansion of our consulting practice. In addition to our safety consultants, VRSA first added a law enforcement consultant in 2005, followed by a human resources consultant in 2006. Several years later, a communications consultant was added and the law enforcement consultant position expanded to provide consultation for all aspects of public safety, including fire and emergency medical services.

The most recent addition to VRSA's consulting program is our local government consultant position, held by former VRSA Members' Supervisory Board member and Smithfield Town Manager Peter Stephenson.

While each of these positions are different, they all provide services designed to ease the worries of our members.

For the small town clerk managing multiple responsibilities including HR decisions - our HR Consultant is there with expertise in local government employment laws, FMLA, ADA, and much more.

For the police department, firehouse, or ambulance authority needing an outside perspective on policies and procedures or training on a specific topic, our Public Safety Consultant is there to provide technical assistance, on-site risk assessment, liability training, Below 100 program training, loss and injury analysis, mutual aid agreement drafting, and more.

For the member who suddenly finds themselves on the receiving end of reporter inquiries and questions from citizens, our Communications Consultant is there to assist in preparing messaging, statements, and media relations consulting.

And for the local government managers working tirelessly to keep up from day to day, our Local Government Consultant is there to identify emerging risks and challenges in finance,



budgeting, and compliance, and to provide consulting on: council/manager governance; community relationship management; ethics; strategic planning; effective service delivery; and more.

However, the core of VRSA's service delivery has always been, and will always be, our claims management.

VRSA's workers' compensation program provides 24-hour claim reporting and access to a registered nurse; first-fill prescription services for injured employees; assistance with creating return-to-work programs; access to programs designed to address opioid dependence; a panel of physicians; access to a nurse specializing in occupational injuries to serve as the injured employee's patient advocate;

pharmacy management programs; medical cost-containment services; and more.

In early 2019, VRSA implemented telemedicine as a healthcare option for injured workers. Today, in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, this option is proving more essential than ever.

Akos, the company VRSA contracts to provide telemedicine for injured workers, says they have seen requests to implement telemedicine from other workers' compensation providers increase substantially in the wake of COVID-19.

VRSA's telemedicine option is available to all members purchasing workers' compensation coverage and is automatically added to all members' panel of physicians.

Other services VRSA contracts for member use include EPL Assist, a public official's liability hotline for members seeking counsel and advice on a

variety of issues involving employment law. For the last 40 years, VRSA has continued to listen to our members, and has responded with coverages, services, and resources to assist members with what worries them.

We have done this while maintaining remarkable rate stability. VRSA's commitment to data collection and loss analysis has allowed appropriate pricing both on a coverage and member basis. The combination of accurate underwriting and claims loss reserving has allowed VRSA to maintain rate stability over the years.

While rates have remained stable, a focus on risk management and mitigation have led to VRSA's unparalleled financial strength.

While the future remains uncertain and the current times unprecedented, they say the best predictor of the future is the past.

For 40 years, VRSA has met the challenges faced by local governments head on by providing additional coverages, resources, programs and services to address what worries our members. And we will continue to do so for the foreseeable future.



If the last 40 years has shown us anything, it is that we are stronger together than we are apart. Pooling our risks, resources, and expertise together will help us all navigate the uncertain future ahead. With \$139 million in members' equity, VRSA is well positioned to ensure stability in coverage for Virginia's local governments, and to continue providing top-notch services, programs and resources to ensure our members can focus on what matters most - serving their communities.





VRSA Financial Results

Below are highlights of 2020 financial results on an unaudited basis. We are in the process of completing our financial audit and will have it available as part of our Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) by the end of December. Members are encouraged to view the CAFR on our website at www.vrsa.us.

Member contributions totaled \$58.5 million which represents a 4.5 percent increase compared to the prior year. Contributions are dependent on numerous factors including changes in membership, member payrolls, payroll classifications, lines of coverage, quantity and value of owned property, member loss experience and underwriting rates. While these factors often fluctuate each year, the Pool has emphasized rate stability throughout its history.

Investment income increased 3.5 percent in 2020 to a total of \$9.3 million. Additionally, the fair market value of investments reflects an increase of \$11.8 million as compared to an increase of \$13.5 million in 2019. The net increase or decrease in the fair market value of investments is dependent on many factors including the type of security, the maturity date, the credit worthiness of the issuer as well as changes in the general economy. The change in fair market value of investments in 2020 was attributable to changes in these factors.

Losses for the year were \$38.9 million which represented an increase from the previous year by 2.4 percent. The Pool's overall loss ratio for 2020 is 66.5 percent. The Pool has experienced several years of better than expected loss results which have favorably impacted our financial results. However loss trends change quickly and adverse development can have negative consequences on Pool operations. The Pool carefully considers both actual losses as well as expected losses when setting rates and determining reinsurance retention levels.

Overall net position increased by \$18.5 million driven largely by the increase in the fair market value of investments. This brings net position as of June 30, 2020 to \$139.9 million. Net position is an important barometer in gauging the financial strength of an insurance pool. The more net position a Pool has the more flexibility it has when it comes to setting rates, obtaining reinsurance and expanding coverages.
